University of Alaska COVID-19 Student Testing Guidance

1) Testing

- a) In accordance with the UA On-site In accordance with the LIA Chesite operations plan, university operation plans, and consistent with CDC
 guidance (COVID-19 testing will be required of students coming onto University of Alaska campuses in the
 university sponsored activities to undergo testing as well.
- Students who are arriving in Alaska from other states and countries after August 10, 2020 or at any point during the academic year.

These requirements are aligned with State of Alaska Health Mandar 10.1 (Updated August 5, 2020)² governing intensate travel (by way of land, sea, and air), and are reflected on the State of Alaska COVID Travelers website, https://covid/0.jate/state/s ersity will adhere to those more restrictive policies.

Any student that has tested positive with COVID-19 cannot travel to Alaska until they have been Any student that has tested positive with COVID-19 cannot travel to Alaska until they have released from isolation or cleared for travel by a medical provider or public health agency. Students arriving into the state should complete a "Travel Declaration" form: largo (leep kelvin care) and a "Self-Isolation Plan" (see definitions) on the "Alaska Travel Portal."

All students must comply with one of the following options:

a. Testing options when arriving by air

<u>Anation Liprocented</u>

Students are strongly encouraged to have the results from a molecular-based test for COVID-19 that was completed within 72 hours before departing for Alaska.

- Those with positive test results cannot come to Alaska until they have been released from isolation or cleared for travel by a medical provider or public health agency. Those with negative test results should:

- Those with negative text results should:

 upload the negative result into the Alaska Travel Portal¹, and
 bring those lost results with them for presentation to airport screeners (or marine transport, border, or other screeners) and to the university.

Campus Entry Restrictions

To reduce the risk of the spread of the coronavirus in our campuses and in our communities, the following governs access to university campuses and facilities and applies to all university affiliates, visitors and contractors.

Federal, state and local restrictions
All university affiliates, visitors and contractors are expected to abide by the terms of existing federal, state, or local orders, mandates, alerts and advisories. All university affiliates, visitors and contractors must first check the following sites and comply before reviewing university restrictions:

If you cannot comply with federal, state and local guidance, the guidance in this document, as well as the university restrictions, you must not come onto a UA campus or into a UA facility.

Anyone coming onto university campuses or sites must comply with applicable university operational guidelines and protective measures.









Where are we now?

- The bad news:
 - COVID spread is uncontrolled across the U.S.
 - Roughly a third of carriers are asymptomatic
 - Growing evidence that children are not immune
 - Public health is can't keep up with testing and contact tracing
 - A coordinated federal response is unlikely
- The good news (such as it is):
 - Spread in SE Alaska remains relatively low
 - There more treatment options available

UA Campus Entry Restrictions

Until medically cleared, no person may come on campus who:

- Has been diagnosed with COVID
- Is symptomatic
- Has had close contact with COVID
- Has been outside Alaska in the past 2 weeks

Fall 2020 @ UAS

- Most classes and services will be online
- 30% of courses will be available face-to-face
- Most employees will work remotely
- Limited housing is available
- The Juneau recreation center is open
- Buildings will be open for students as needed, but not the public

Realistic Assumptions

We assume that:

- Despite our precautions and restrictions, there will be asymptomatic COVID positive people on campus
- Things are going to get worse, and there will be multiple local surges throughout the fall

So:

- Assume everyone else is an asymptomatic carrier
- Then, assume you may be asymptomatic as well

How do we keep campus safe?

Be a visible example of respect for others:

- Wear your face covering
- Maintain physical distancing and avoid gathering in groups
- Use provided cleaning supplies to sanitize spaces before and after you use them
- Follow any additional safety measures communicated by your dean or director
